The Compton Chronicles

1943 - 44

CPS School Pic 1943-44

In 1943-44 Compton Primary School was in its 80th year. The Principal at the time was L.P. Fogarty (1941-45).

During this time the monarch was George VI and the world was in the midst of World War II (1939-1945). The cost of living in the 1940s was around \$800 for a car, \$6,550 for a house with the average annual salary being \$1,900.

We found this picture from 1943-44 in our archives with a list of names attached. A wonderful piece of our history here at CPS.
