Japanese Showcase

In the last week of Term 3, students cooked Okonomiyaki, a Japanese style, savoury pancake to celebrate our learning topic on Japanese food. The word 'yaki' means to fry or grill and 'okonomi' means 'however you prefer it' or 'whatever ingredients you like'. Students worked respectfully in small groups, sharing the tasks to add or mix the ingredients and flip their pancakes. They were pleasantly surprised how yummy they tasted. Most of our students have only ever tried sweetened pancakes topped with honey, sugar and jam.

Students learned about the cultural expression 'itadakimasu.' This means to give thanks to the person who prepared the meal. This polite expression is used when receiving a meal in Japanese culture. I would like to express my gratitude to both Pam and Shirley our wonderful SSOs who assisted and supported in the preparation and supervision during cooking. Thank you for making our sessions run smoothly.

Our Japanese showcase was held on the Wednesday afternoon in Week 10. The 6/7s were in charge of facilitating origami (paper folding) tutorials and they did an amazing job, so thank you all for your wonderful leadership skills. The 6/7s assisted small groups of students with following stepby-step instructions, taking photos and operating the IWB.

We had the opportunity to make three origami creations - a samurai helmet, a Pokemon bookmark and a fox. We liked the way the samurai helmet transformed into a fish when you folded it a different way. This was a very enjoyable and successful afternoon that we hope to do again in the future.

A big welcome back to Term 4! We have a busy and exciting term ahead of us!

Maths: This term in mathematics we are continuing to learn strategies to solve multiplication and division problems. We will also be investigating measurement and geometry.

Writing: Through writing lessons students will be learning about a new text type, 'poetry'. Over the course of the term students will have the opportunity to write a range of creative poems for a variety of purposes. We are continuing to focus on our self and peer editing skills also.

Science: This term the area of focus is 'Earth and Space'. Students will be learning about our Earths changes overtime, as well as our solar system.



Welcome to Week 1 Term 4 2021.

I hope everyone's two-week break has been restful and fun. We all are going to have so much happening in the next nine weeks!

Here are some pictures of us loving our healthy brain break. Our class skip counts by 8s each time an apple is cut with the apple cutter into 8 pieces.

Our class has got up to 12 students having an apple one morning. Apples have definitely been the flavour for last term!



In Art, last term we all enjoyed making and designing our own crystal creations. We are loving having them hanging in our class. Another art activity of designing a bird with different materials of flowers saw all children's creativity being used.



Reflection from Miss Perryman

While on placement, I have been working alongside Toni Hamilton in the Reception/year 1 class to cover a range of units across the curriculum.

Our health unit allowed children to explore how they had already grown and changed from birth to now and to describe the ways they may continue to change. It was wonderful seeing so much of the children's personalities and individuality shine through in their responses from dying their hair as teenagers to walking around with a walking stick and drinking tea as an elderly person.

During PE, students demonstrated their personal and social skills to play highly competitive games of poison ball. Focussing on safety and the fundamental movement skills they would use during a game, we started the unit teaching effective ways to throw balls of varying sizes and practicing using our locomotor, and non-locomotive movement skills to solve movement challenges.


The foundation children were introduced to explaining the duration of events by using specific mathematical language such as seconds, minutes, hours, days, weeks, months, years, and seasons. During this time, the year | used this language to explain the duration of events. This tied in well to their science unit.

The children observed and developed their skills in describing how the landscape and sky changes. We did this by participating in daily weather observations where they drew what the sky looked like in the morning and afternoon. They then had to communicate the changes that occurred in the weather and sky during the day. The children loved drawing an outfit appropriate for the weather for each day and sharing their predictions with their peers.

During music the children loved learning about soundscapes and how they can use natural, vocal, and instrumental sounds to create a soundscape. They worked on moving away from relying on their voices to recreate sounds and explore high level sounds such as using a drum for footsteps or beanbag for leaves rustling.

Finally, our art pieces linked into our science as we explored how trees change throughout the year depending on the season. They explored using different techniques such as creating collages, painting using pompoms and broccolini and using crayons to draw their tree trunks. Our responding activity showed that the children loved using the new techniques such as pompoms in paint and the broccolini to create their trees.
